Miami Railway Station Museum to celebrate 135th birthday on Aug. 18

The Miami Railway Station Museum will celebrate its 135th birthday with festivities from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Aug. 18. Come one, come all to Miami for the annual Music and BBQ Night sponsored by Valley Fiber, as they mark the 135th anniversary of the railway station's construction.

Built-in 1889 by the Manitoba and Northern Pacific Railway, the Station has been meticulously preserved to reflect the life and times of a prairie station agent, his family, and their community. As a National Historic and Municipal Heritage site, the museum stands out as the only Station of its architectural type still in its original location in Canada.

Several significant additions have been made to the museum in recent years, enhancing its historical authenticity and visitor experience. Among these are:

- A restored 1914 wooden caboose.
- A train shed constructed according to 1920's plans.
- 280 feet of rail.
- A platform surrounding the building's exterior.

Inside the museum, visitors can explore various rail displays, a photo gallery, a model railway, and exhibits depicting the lifestyle of station agents and their families.

The latest and most intriguing addition to the museum is the Fallout Reporting Post. This unique exhibit replaces the original post buried west of the Station during the Cold War era in the 1960s. The station agent would have used this post to monitor radiation levels in the event of a nuclear

It will offer a rare glimpse into the fears and responses of that tumultuous time, making it the only example of this style and type of post in Canada open to the public. Event attendees will be able to see the progress made in preparing the Fallout Reporting Post for its future grand opening.

To mark this historic milestone, the museum will host a celebration featuring a BBQ, with all funds raised going towards the museum, live music, games, and presentations. A local musician, Joey McNair, will grace the museum stage and perform throughout the event.

Briscoe riding out dream with RCMP Musical Ride

Andrew Briscoe fell off the first horse he rode.

That November day in the nation's capital in 2020 has become an ironic moment for Briscoe, who got back on the saddle and is now a member of the RCMP Musical Ride.

"The moment I fell off was the moment I realized that I had underestimated how challenging it is to ride horses," Briscoe said.

The 40-year-old Ashern resident has come a long way since he chose to pursue a lifelong dream four years

The RCMP Musical Ride, which is touring Manitoba this summer, made a stop in Carman last week, where 32 Calvary performed to promote the RCMP and help raise funds for local charities and non-profit groups.

The special unit of equestrians also celebrated 50 years of women in the RCMP on this night, which coincidentally fell on a year when the Musical Ride has an all-female supervisory

It was a remarkable night to many, but perhaps none more so than Bris-

Briscoe grew up outside of Ottawa and curled out of the RCMP Curling Club, which shares a fence with the Musical Ride stables. As a 14-year-old he pondered what it would be like to tour the country riding horses for a

spent 15 years policing parts of Manitoba — Ashern, Gillam, Morden before joining Selkirk Traffic Services.

During that time, he met his wife, had three daughters and grew to love Manitoba.

In 2020, the RCMP was taking applications to its Musical Ride unit. While Briscoe knew his wife and kids wouldn't relocate to Ottawa while he took the training program, the opportunity meant too much to him to let it pass by when he was accepted.

"I figured that since I didn't find too many happy people when I was in traffic services — only my boss on a good day whenever I came back with lots of traffic tickets — I thought coming to the Musical Ride I'd be able to meet lots of happy people, and it's amazing how many people there are," he said.

Briscoe underwent more than seven months of training — a five-week introduction course and a six-month intermediate program — in which he rode horses for 90 minutes twice a day, cared for the animals and learned about the history of the ceremonial

It struck a chord with him when the RCMP celebrated 150 years of service last year and he was on a horse, what he treated as an ode to true mounties.

"To be part of such an iconic piece of Canadiana is just astonishing. I don't want to use my horse's name but it's pretty Impressive," Briscoe quipped.
"To be a part of this unit is such a

close to this. It's so remarkable and incredible to be a part of this team."

Riders in the Musical Ride typically change horses every year, but Briscoe is riding 'Impressive' for the second summer in a row since his designated horse, 'Lexie,' went for surgery.

Briscoe and Impressive have knit a tight bond since meeting in the intermediate module of the equestrian course in 2021. Save for a one-year stint with another horse in 2022, Impressive is one of the only horses Briscoe has known.

"Impressive, he's just like us. Sometimes we struggle with confidence issues and sometimes Impressive also struggles with that. So it takes a little bit of extra love and reassurance from his rider telling him, 'It's going to be OK,' Briscoe said. "He's a very affectionate, sweet horse that I'm very ecstatic to be able to have for a second year."

"He's never let me down."

Briscoe is now in his final season of a four-year term with the Musical Ride, which has also toured Ontario this summer.

In that time, he has attended countless parades, been a part of performances for dignitaries like the Governor General, met the King of England and represented Canada in the Colour Party.

Briscoe conceded it has been difficult at times to be away from his wife and kids — who still reside in Ashern — for weeks at a time. However, his family will typically meet him at several show stops across the country each summer and spend a few days with him, and that's been made all the easier to do this year with him touring Manitoba.

"It definitely is difficult, anybody that has to travel away from home work. I think of myself as being pretty lucky, my wife and children have been able to come out to see us at different times," Briscoe said.

"Having three daughters back in Ashern, I wish I could spend more time there, but with this opportunity, it's one of those short-term pain for long-term gains. Throughout the rest of my career, I'll be able to tell hopefully my great-grandkids about when I toured the country from coast to coast and met the current king of England. It's quite the opportunity I've had."

Briscoe will return to Ashern to resume normal police work in October for a temporary assignment, which will help him keep his placing skills up to date.

In the meantime, he will continue to ride out a dream.

Quiet Mile Flower Co. cultivates connections through flowers

As the vibrant hues of summer begin to fade, there's a special week dedicated to celebrating the beauty and joy that flowers bring into our lives. From Aug. 15-21, Canadian Flowers Week takes centre stage, inviting flower enthusiasts and casual admirers alike to revel in nature's colorful creations. At the heart of this celebration is Elsa VanLaar's Quiet Mile Flower Co., Quiet Mile Flower Co., a blossoming gem nestled in Carman

VanLaar was born and raised in Carman. She is the daughter of a farmer and a flower lover and inherited her love of plants and gardening from her parents.

"I can thank my parents for my love of plants and flowers," said VanLaar. "In 2015, my husband and I, with our family, moved back to my childhood home to help take care of my mom. My parents passed away in 2021, and I found working with the soil and flowers to be a comfort and reminder of God's care."

VanLaar completed the Floret Cut Flower Course in early 2022 and soon after started Quiet Mile Flower Co. This small specialty cut flower business sells fresh seasonal bouquets and bunches at the Carman Farmer's Market, through bouquet subscriptions, and custom orders. She also supplies local flowers for some area florists and some weddings.

"I love to share my love of flowers," said Van Laar. "We were privileged to be a part of the Celebration of Gardens Tour this year and really enjoyed having people come out to see the gardens.'

VanLaar grows a mix of annuals, perennials, and bulbs; almost all of them are started in the winter months in her "Flower Shed." The first ones to hit the dirt are lisianthus and eucalyptus, which she begins in the first week of January. These are followed by snapdragons, asters, strawflowers, zinnias, sunflowers and many more. Bulbs, tubers and corms such as lilies, dahlias and ranunculus are also prestarted inside.

"We grow more than 80 types of flowers, many of them in different varieties and colours. The flower shed fills right up and is bursting at the seams by the time the weather warms up enough to move some into a small, unheated greenhouse. We usually have to drag them in and out for a few weeks before it's totally safe to leave them outside and plant them in the soil."

The main flower patch at VanLaar's home contains 4' wide beds covered with landscape fabric to help maintain moisture and keep down the

weeds. Because Quiet Mile plants so intensively, they add a good layer of compost before planting. Irrigation with drip tape helps them keep up with some of the watering, though nothing beats a good rainfall.

"Since most cut flower varieties are tall, we use support netting to help keep them upright. The prairie wind can do a lot of damage, and so can weeds, bugs, pests and diseases. It's a steep learning curve to meet these challenges, and there will always be something to deal with."

Through it all, VanLaar has learned that flowers are an essential part of life and is keen on showing off her flowers to others.

"They help us communicate friendship, love, concern, sympathy and celebration," said VanLaar. "Sometimes, we need to treat those around us or enjoy a vaseful of beauty on our kitchen tables. Find yourself some flowers in the garden, at the florists, or visit us at the Farmer's Market for wrapped bouquets. During the month of August, try your hand at making your own bouquet with our stem buckets."

VanLaar works very hard for her business and is thankful for the help from her husband and family. In this crazy world, working with soils and flowers gives hope and a strong reminder that we are loved. It's her goal to share that love through locally grown flowers. 

Adults with disability, children under 18 now eligible for federal dental plan

Adults with disability, children under 18 now eligible for federal dental care plan

The federal government recently expanded eligibility to its Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP) and now includes adults with a valid disability tax credit certificate and children under 18.

Subsidized dental care is a first for Canada. With encouragement from the federal NDP, the Liberal government introduced the first phase of a subsidized dental program in December 2022 with the aim of improving the oral health of millions of Canadians lacking private dental coverage.

The program will be rolled out in phases.

Canada's health minister Mark Holland and minister of northern affairs Dan Vandal made an announcement in Winnipeg in late June about enhanced eligibility to the program. The two new groups represent over a million more Canadians that will soon have access to more affordable oral health services.

"Expanding eligibility to the CDCP to children under the age of 18 and to adults with valid Disability Tax Credits will mean that more than

one million additional Canadians will have affordable access to the oral health care they need," said Holland in a June 27 news release from Health Canada. "This is about fairness and making sure people have access to the care they need to be healthy and have the dignity they deserve."

The federal government's program pays a percentage of the cost of dental services for Canadian residents who don't have access to private dental health insurance, who have a net family income of less than \$90,000 and who filed an income tax return.

The CDCP helps make dental care more affordable for up to nine million Canadians who don't have dental coverage.

The federal government had launched the plan for in December 2022. The interim program was called the Canada Dental Benefit (CBD) and helped lower dental costs for almost 450,000 kids. That program expired on June 30 and parents or guardians can now apply for the CDCP.

Eligible seniors aged 65 years and older can also sign up for the CDCP.

Over 2 million seniors have been approved to receive coverage under the plan since its launch, and since May 1, more than 200,000 have used the plan for oral health services such as clean-

ings, fillings and dentures, states the release.

Sun Life is administering the program. Those eligible for the CDCP will receive a welcome package from the insurance company within three months of applying for the program. It will contain information on their coverage start date and what services are eligible for coverage.

There are over 11,400 oral health providers such as dentists, denturists and hygienists currently providing services to people eligible for the CDCP. People who don't have a dentist or other oral health provider can use Sun Life's CDCP Provider Search service to find one in their community.

As of July 8, oral health providers which aren't part of the CDCP program can bill Sun Life directly for any care they provide to a CDCP client. Those providers don't have to formally participate in the program.

CDCP participants may have to pay additional dental charges depending on what services they received and the cost of those treatments.

Eligible Canadians between the ages of 18 and 64 will be able to apply online in 2025 for the CDCP.







A Day in the Trenches

A dedicated group of volunteers helped bring history to life last Sunday at the Manitoba World War One Museum west of La Riviere.

The annual Day in the Trenches not only had them in uniform making presentations with various artifact displays but also featured a number of them in a re-enactment of a battle in the trenches.

It is both a passion and respect for history which drives them to be involved in this event every year, they say.

"It's a blast. I've always enjoyed history ever since I was a little boy, and to put on the uniform, come outside here and at least experience part of it ... to experience part of what soldiers were put through, it's been invaluable," said Landon Seaman, who drove up from North Dakota to volunteer for a third year.

"I was looking to get into living history stuff, and I had a bunch of British and Commonwealth gear at home," said Seaman, who recalled posting about his collection on Facebook. He then connected with Bruce Tascona, who operates the Pembina Valley war museum, and started volunteering at A Day in the Trenches. "Putting it on for all these people too, giving them a little bit of an idea what it was like, feels meaningful.

"I especially like coming up here too because the visitors are much more engaged with it," Seaman added. "They're engaged, they ask good questions, and they are just great people to talk with us."

Loic Bazin of Winnipeg is one of the veteran volunteers, having participated for eight or nine years.

His involvement also stemmed from having done other re-enactments and connecting with another person who shared this interest.

"Between shooting at each other, we got to talking about World War One ... so we thought, 'Cool, let's do it,'" he said. "Every time Bruce says, 'You want to come play in the big sandbox?' I go, 'Yes.'"

Bazin also sees the importance of passing on this history now that it's getting increasingly further removed from today's generations.

"It's about passing on that information hopefully to the next generations in a bid to make sure that it's not something that gets forgotten. It's a hugely important part of our history.

"It's a real blast ... I love doing public presentations like this. I've done it for over a decade in different uniforms, different languages, and I find it to be always fun," Bazin added. "Absolutely, it's fun, and it's important for people to learn about all of this."


(8-5) and Ontario Southwest Revolution (8-1), with losses to only the Fraser Valley Fusion (BC) by a 16-9 score.

"We've been racing there now for 15 years roughly," said Braden Friesen, who is part of the track committee. "It seems to be growing every year now. It's exciting to see more people getting into it the past few years especially."

He noted attendance has been very good at the races, so it seems to have built a strong following here in southern Manitoba.

"It seems like it has been growing pretty consistently in the past few years," he said. "It is a very cool community to be a part of ... and it's a very growing community and a very welcoming community. It makes it very easy for beginners to get into it. There's beginner classes at the races, so it's very accessible."

Friesen said a big part of the draw is simply that it is a bit of an extreme sport. "There's a level of adrenaline that

comes into it as a racer ... the excitement of lining up against 40 of your colleagues bar to bar and trying to be the first one to get into that corner when you're racing," he said.

"It's always an exciting feeling and always a bit of adrenaline flowing," he added. "And as spectators, it's exciting to watch ... you've got dirt and jumps and all of the excitement that comes with it."

The racing also has a wide age range with the beginners starting as young as four years old, and it goes all the way up to a few who are in their 60s.

The weekend begins Saturday with the pit bike races which feature smaller bikes on a smaller track, so there is just a little more of a for-fun feel to it.

The main race day is Sunday starting at 8:30 a.m. and going to around 4 p.m.. The Youth For Christ food truck will be there, with breakfast also being served in support of a local nonprofit organization.


A celebration of life will be held for the family. Interment will take place at the Greenwood Cemetery in Carman.

Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 15 minutes Servings: 12

11/4 cups white whole-wheat flour

teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon baking soda 1

1/8 teaspoon salt

1 large egg cup maple syrup 1/2

teaspoons vanilla extract

3/4

cup plain nonfat Greek yogurt cup unsweetened applesauce

Mixed Berry Whole-Wheat Muffins

cup chopped strawberries cup blueberries

Preheat oven to 400 F. Grease muffin pan and set aside.

In medium bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. In separate large bowl, mix egg, maple syrup, vanilla, yogurt and applesauce.

Add dry ingredients to wet ingredients and stir until just combined. Do not overmix. Fold in strawberries and blueberries.

Pour batter into prepared muffin tin, filling cups about 3/4 full.

Bake 15 minutes, or until tops are golden brown and toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Remove from oven and let cool in muffin tin 5 minutes before removing.

Ask the money lady

Dear Money Lady,

I am 81 years of age. I have \$50,000 to invest. In your opinion, what is the best investment today, GIC's or Mutual Funds? My banker wants me to buy into a TD mutual fund. Thank you, Grant.

Grant,

Considering your age, I would think you are better off with GICs rather than MFs (mutual funds) regardless of which bank you choose. Currently the GIC rates are posted at 3% - 4.5% (June, 2024). Of course, you stand to make more money on your investment if you place it in the market, but my concern would be stock market volatility. If the market turned volatile due to an unforeseen future event, you could lose a fair chunk of this investment and would need to leave it invested to realize the recovery when the market comes back. Also, we are going into a USA election this Fall and even though this is in another country, please do not underestimate the market swings that we encounter from our Southern neighbors. To be honest Grant, I would rather see you in a GIC, than in the stock market.

That being said, if the market is where you would like to go, why not consider ETFs (exchange traded funds) rather than MFs. They are much less costly and can be traded multiple times throughout the day, unlike MFs which must trade at the end of the day, based on the overall NAV price (net asset value per share). The following ETFs have lower fees and will follow a reliable market index that you can count on. Please remember that these funds are equity heavy and prone to much more volatility, but over a long-time horizon, because they are growthoriented investments, you should expect an overall return of 7.1%.

If the stock market is something you would prefer to steer clear of, you could choose GICs. I would suggest you split and ladder up your funds into Canadian Bank GICs. To give you access to your money should you need it, I would suggest putting \$10,000-\$20,000 into a 1-year term cashable GIC offered with all the Big-5 banks at 3% (June 2024). Local credit unions typically have higher redeemable rates on 1-year cashable GICs since they want to increase their deposits. You mostly likely could get a 1-year cashable GIC from a credit union at 4% today (June 2024).

By placing \$20,000 into a cashable GIC, you still have the ability to access and use these funds should you change your mind or need money for an emergency. The balance of your investment, the \$30,000, should be put into a 1-year term non-redeemable GIC that is offered currently at all banks and credit unions for 4.5%. If you were to invest your \$50,000 this way, you would earn \$2,150 over the next 12 months.

Mandarin **Orange** No-Bake **Tarts**

Prep time: 10 minutes

Freeze time: 1 hour

1 cup graham cracker crumbs

2 tablespoons butter, melted

1 cup plain nonfat Greek yogurt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 tablespoons honey or maple syrup 4 mandarin oranges, peeled and segmented

In bowl, mix graham cracker crumbs with melted butter.
